

Greetings once again to our dear family members. How time flies, we are at the end of the year. As promised when I assumed the office of President I would keep you informed and updated of association's activities.

In 2004 the association received Federal/ State funding to cater for ethnic Australians with disabilities, up to the age of 70. The program is called the Home and Community Care programme or HACC. The coordinator of the Programme is Saro Fernando who has been with the programme since its inception and has achieved marvelous success in building it up to its present stature.



The program has 112 registered clients, 45 for Domestic Assistance/ Social Support and 67 for Centre Based Day Care. Most clients are picked up and dropped off at their homes in the association's buses. From the client's feedback, they had a wonderful time going for picnics, lunches at Pubs and at the association, and participating in a few sing along.

We work in collaboration with government agencies such as Centre Link and other related agencies. Our clients are constantly kept abreast of current government regulations, issues, formalities and entitlements through presentations and talks.

The HACC Program has been so successful that we have applied for a further growth subsidy from the government to extend the programme. The staff attend the personal development to upgrade their skills through Community West. The Community Aged Care Package programme (CACP) has recently undergone an audit and we are pleased to report a successful outcome, with a few recommendations which are being adopted.

I wish to welcome Manil de Mel as the CCP coordinator. I take this occasion to thank Tholla for her contributions to the association. I wish to thank all those who contributed to the Issues Paper to the Productivity Council on "Caring for Older Australians". The association has also been requested to contribute to a Pre Budget Submission Paper on Emergency Relief. If you wish to have an input please contact the office ASAP.

I was greatly honored and delighted to attend several of our community functions ranging from the End-all-Fit dinner to the Anglo Indian Reunion Concert, the Thai Australian Association Dinner and Concert, The Great Australian Breakfast, the Chinese National Day celebrations and our own Bingo Night where monies were raised for the Pakistani Flood Appeal.

Congratulations Denzil D' Vauz, who has been re-elected as President of The Burmese Association of Western Australia at their recent AGM. I was honored to be their returning officer. I would also like to congratulate Roshan Bura, as the new President of WA Sri Lanka Association. New organizations are continuously joining our conglomerate. I personally thank you for your support and the tremendous trust you have placed in me as your President to lead the associations into exciting new multicultural heights in the future.

Australian Government

Department of Families, Housing, Community Services and Indigenous Affairs

From 1 January 2011, Australia's first national Paid Parental Leave scheme will start. Legislation for the scheme came into force on 14 July 2010.

Parents planning to have or adopt a child on or after 1 January 2011 need to be aware of the scheme and consider how decisions they make now about work could affect their eligibility for Paid Parental Leave.

A brochure for parents has been translated into 15 languages and copies of the relevant brochures have been enclosed for your use and distribution. The brochures provide key facts about the Government-funded Paid Parental Leave scheme and how it will operate.

As an important body, your association comes into contact with many relevant organisations that reach parents and prospective parents on a daily basis. Your membership and networks may find these brochures useful.

WA GIVES \$100,000 TO PAKISTAN FLOOD VICTIMS

THE West Australian government will donate \$100,000 to the Australian Red Cross Pakistan disaster relief appeal.

Premier Colin Barnett said in a statement on Wednesday that the Pakistan floods were a major tragedy.

"Today's donation on behalf of Western Australia will be used by the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent societies for a range of disaster relief measures, including basic food and household needs, emergency shelter and emergency health services," he said.

Mr Barnett said the flooding had claimed 1600 lives, destroyed 750,000 homes and affected more than 20 million people.

As is customary The Australia Asia Association rallied to the cause of our Asian counterparts with the recent devastation of the floods in Pakistan. **A BINGO EVENING** was organised and a substantial amount was raised which was then handed over to the President of the Islamic Association to support the efforts of aid workers. The evening was very casual and a welcome start to the weekend.


was based on the belief that, despite the Anglo-Indians living in so many countries, they were one community.

New child restraint laws for Western Australia

New laws came into effect on 1 October 2010 that introduced new rules for the restraint of children in vehicles. The new laws will reduce the risk of injury caused by the use of unsuitable restraints for a child's size by specifying the type of

restraint to be used at different ages and where children must be seated in a vehicle.

The WA Road Traffic Code 2000 requires that children from birth to the age of six months have to be restrained in a rearward facing child restraint e.g. infant capsule. From six months up to the age of four years to be restrained in either a rearward or forward facing child restraint either in built harness, and from four years up to the age of seven years to be restrained in either a forward facing child restraint or booster seat restrained by correctly adjusted an fastened seat belt or child safety harness.

Impairment discrimination on the rise



Equal Opportunity Commission (EOC) 2009/2010 statistics show a large increase in disability discrimination complaints over the past year in Western Australia.

In 2008/2009 there were 107 formal complaints made on the grounds of impairment, which jumped to 174 in the 2009/2010 financial year, a 63 per cent increase.

Equal Opportunity Commissioner Yvonne Henderson said this showed that people living with a disability in WA felt they were not getting a fair go in the community.

"People with disabilities are coming forward about a lack of access to jobs due to a fear of employees who have had a mental illness and issues such as a lack of cinemas for hearing and sight impaired in WA."

"We are also seeing complaints from the parents of children with disabilities who believe their children are being discriminated against because of an impairment," she said.

The Commissioner said although most complaints that came through the EOC were conciliated, respondents often found out the hard way that policies, procedures and behaviour in their organisations needed to be reviewed.

"One person complained that colleagues were treating her inappropriately when she returned to work after recovering from a depressive illness."

"The employer gave a written apology and a \$9,000 payment to the employee, as during conciliation it was found that workplace policies and procedures had not been followed," Ms Henderson said.

A similar outcome took place when the parent of an autistic child removed the child from his school because he was not being given the appropriate care and education he needed.

Following conciliation the principal gave the parent a written apology and a monetary payment of \$5,000.

"People with a disability or a loved one with a disability already have to put up with a lot without the added stress of making a discrimination complaint,"

"If you have a person with impairment working in your organisation or using your facilities, find out how to accommodate them before they make a complaint," Ms Henderson said.

Mental Health

Mental Health Minister Graham Jacobs announced today that Centrecare Inc was the preferred non-government organisation to implement the \$13million 'Western Australian Suicide Prevention Strategy 2009-2013'.

"Centrecare is one of Western Australia's most wellestablished, professional and innovative providers of specialist social services. It is a not-for-profit organisation which delivers a wide range of quality services across WA.

"Centrecare have demonstrated a clear understanding of the strategy, a strong community focus and excellent organisational structures." "About 2,000 Australians die from suicide every year. For every person who dies in this way, there are at least another 30 people who attempt suicide," Dr Jacobs said.

"In Australia over the last 20 years, there have been more deaths from suicide than fatalities on our roads.

"That means suicide is everybody's business; family and friends of the person who has died experience great sadness and grief, and as a community we share their pain and have a role to play in preventing this loss of life.

65 AND NOT OUT: Who works past retirement age?

The most and least educated workers are the ones likely to work beyond the age of 65, according to new research published by the National Centre for Vocational Education Research (NCVER).

Dr Tom Karmel, Managing Director, NCVER said it commissioned the three-year research program examining older workers and their use of skills in light of Australia's ageing population and the impact this will have on labour supply.

Who works beyond the 'standard' retirement age and why?, by Chris Ryan and Mathias Sinning, finds the participation rate of workers over 65 years has increased over time, which is likely to be the result of more women in the labour market.

"The report shows that there is a hollowing out of the workforce around the age of 65", said Dr Karmel.

"In all likelihood this is because the most educated tend to have more interesting jobs with higher wage levels, where as the least educated may well be working to maintain living standards".

To encourage older workers to remain in the workforce longer, the research points to the importance of retirement income policies and making work more satisfying, perhaps by offering flexible work arrangements.

Policies that also focus on closing the gender wage gap between older male and female workers may encourage more women to remain in the labour force. A gender wage gap of about 30% was found among older workers.

Bunk beds

Bunk beds can cause serious or fatal injuries if they are poorly made or used incorrectly. Dangers include falling from the top bunk or trapping small heads and limbs.

Consumer Protection says


- Get a tape measure and check the size of gaps on bunk beds.
- ☐ Children under nine should not use bunk beds.
- ☐ Check bunk beds are at least two metres away from ceiling fans or any other overhead hazard.
- Do not put bunk beds close to windows, blinds or curtain cords.

All top bunk beds must have guard rails on all sides of the bed

Make sure you measure - checklist

- ☐ No gaps between 95mm and 230mm in the bunk bed structure.
- ☐ Top of the guardrail must be at least 160mm above the top of the mattress.
- Leave at least two metres between ceiling fans and bunk bed.
- ☐ Check all screws are flush and any protrusions are no more than 5mm.
